Family-friendly cultural attractions

Sherbrooke, July 12th 2023 – Culture vultures and museum goers will love the new tourism offerings this summer, all over the Eastern Townships. Young and old alike can enjoy a range of indoor and outdoor activities, focusing on history, new discoveries and just having fun! Take a look at what's going around the region, listed below:

Sunday in the Townships: Sur la route du patrimoine religieux et spirituel

The Townships Trail is a 430-km driving route that winds through 31 picturesque communities with 16 sites that showcase the region's heritage, history and architecture. Every Sunday, throughout the summer, visitors, armed with the <u>Dimanche dans les Cantons</u> "passport", can discover some of these unique venues. (One famous landmark is the St-Benoît-du-Lac Benedictine Monastery, renowned for its unusual architecture.) In addition to sacred and heritage sites, the passport gives access to a couple of concerts, a museum and an art gallery.

Granby Zoo upgrades its facilities

Upgrades are under way at the <u>Granby Zoo</u>, now celebrating it seventh decade in operation. Two new animal habitats in the Asia sector are being added to the existing enclosures and Amazoo (also part of the Zoo complex) is installing a new aerial adventure course.

The Night Zoo program returns in May. Visitors can stay overnight at a mini-chalet (there are four) for a VIP evening with a naturalist/interpreter who will guide you around the site, as you learn about the animals that live there. Entertainment and a campfire.

Hisséo - A new adventure park at Bromont, montagne d'expériences

<u>Bromont, montagne d'expériences</u> has built a new forest adventure - <u>Hisséo</u> – on Mont Soleil. Various obstacles strung out among the trees, allow young and old to test their agility as they clamber up a climbing wall, whizz along a zipline, grab ropes and sway in a giant swing! (The forest adventure is designed for four different levels of ability.)

Foresta Lumina celebrates its 10th anniversary

This summer, Parc de la Gorge de Coaticook celebrates its 10th anniversary. The illuminated Foresta Lumina night trail didn't take long to become a major tourist venue and since its opening in 2014, it has attracted more than one million visitors. This summer, Forest Lumina will be open day and night, thanks to the high-tech expertise of Moment Factory, which through special effects, has transformed the Gorge into an even more magical place than before!

Abbaye de Saint-Benoît-du-Lac - trilingual audio guides.

The <u>Abbaye de Saint-Benoît-du-Lac</u> Benedictine monastery now offers audio guides in three languages - Spanish, French and English – and they will be available throughout the tourist season (June-September). There will also be guided tours of the Abbey with three daily departures – 9:30am, 1pm and 3pm.

Summer packages with Blue Lavande and the Abbey

The <u>« Forfait Champs Monastiques »</u> is a package combining the attractions of the Abbey with the Bleu Lavande lavender farm. What they have in common are their natural surroundings and in the case of the monastery, an ambience of peace. Flowers, birdsong and artisanal products – a sure-fire formula for forgetting your worldly cares!

Themed days at Bleu Lavande

Every Sunday throughout the summer, <u>Bleu Lavande</u> invites families to enjoy its lavender fields. Various family-oriented activities are on the menu such as live entertainment, face painting and balloons, led by the lavender farm's mascot - a giant bee! Bleu Lavande also runs interactive workshops themed around the many benefits of aromatherapy.

On "Romantic Thursdays" (July 20-August 10) picnics featuring country fare are on offer and between July 23-August 5, the real magic of the site is on display. That's when the rows and rows of lavender plants are in full bloom!

Chill out with the family at the Strøm Spa

The <u>Strøm Spa</u> in Sherbrooke is offering families the opportunity to use its thermal facilities for several mornings during the week of July 19 (until July 23). The entry price includes a towel and use of a locker and spa-goers can chill out from 8am-11am. Children aged 5 and older also have access to the thermotherapy circuit but they have to bring their own bathrobes.

Learn all about bees at Miellerie Lune de Miel

From June 24-September 4, <u>Lune de Miel</u> in Stoke – the first bee interpretation centre in Quebec – is running educational tours about these vital insects. Through an immersive experience, an interpretation area and games, the passionate staff explains the importance to the environment of protecting bees and other pollinating insects. Also onsite are picnic areas and a petting farm.

Éveil du Dragon – a new escape game

This new outdoor <u>escape game</u> to "awaken" a dragon, was designed by a group of rural youth centres and was inspired by myths and legends from Région des Sources. Follow a lost dragon as he tries to find himself with the help of QR codes on around 10 interpretive panels along the Ainés de Saint-Georges-de-Windsor walking trail. The escape game is free of charge.

Ulverton Woolen Mill viewed through modern technology

Located in the Val-Saint-François region, the <u>Ulverton Woolen Mill</u> has just launched a new exhibition entitled *Avant de perdre le fil*. A first for the province of Quebec, it traces the history of the Mill and the manufacturing of wool, though a guided visit that combines virtual reality and 3D sound. It's an immersive experience during which visitors can see and touch what is before them, while learning about a traditional skill that is fast disappearing.

The Ulverton Woolen Mill also hosts a weekly, <u>British-style Bridgerton Tea Party</u> (Wednesdays) and dinner shows (Thursday evenings). The historic site, which sits on the banks

of the Ulverton River, has five kilometres of hiking trails with picnic areas, a covered bridge and an impressive waterfall.

New trails and products at Domaine Alpagas Essencia

<u>Domaine Alpagas Essencia</u> in Hatley has added several new attractions and items to its range of products - hiking trails around the site and quilts fashioned from alpaca fleece. Visitors also get the opportunity interact with these appealing animals.

Thermotherapy at Solstice Sauna

A Nordic spa with a difference! After getting good and hot in the sauna, plunge into the chilly waters of Lake Massawippi.... When <u>Solstice Sauna</u> reopens in the fall of 2023, spa-goers will be able to enjoy private or public 75-minute-long sessions of thermotherapy. Situated on the Municipal Beach in North Hatley, the spa has been designed to blend in with its natural surroundings – a tranquil venue that encourages contemplation, relaxation, connecting with Mother Nature and the opportunity to meet other like-minded souls.

Domaine Muscadine sets up an elk interpretation centre

<u>Domaine Muscadine</u>, an elk breeding farm in Bromont, has opened an interpretation center. Tours run on Saturday afternoons during which the general public can learn more about this breed of large deer, native to North America.

Podcasts reveal two sides of Granby's heritage

By following <u>Granby's interactive heritage circuits</u> (spread over a total of 2 kilometres) with the help of a couple of podcasts and the guidance of a Global Positioning System (GPS), visitors can learn about the city's past. The podcasts entitled "Granby et ses vestiges" and "L'Imperial" cover everything from the history of the buildings to the workers of yesteryear.

A second store for Savonnerie des Diligences

In addition to its original boutique in Eastman, an online store and 350 points of sale across Canada, <u>Savonnerie des Diligences</u> now has a second outlet in Orford (Cherry River). The new store sells a full range of the company's products, including body care.

The Brome-Missisquoi Prohibition Circuit

Along the Circuit de la prohibition you'll learn all about the places that were part of the Prohibition period (1848-1933) in the Brome-Missisquoi region. With the help of an audio guide narrated by fictional bootlegger Alfred Carpentier, drivers can cover the 130-km circuit, which is peppered with tall tales and dodgy characters, recalling the era when booze was smuggled across the Canada/United States border!

New performance space for Granby's summer theatre

The theatre production this summer is moving from the <u>Ancien presbytère</u> de Granby to the École du Verbe Divan – a space that is air-conditioned and can accommodate up to 210 people. Don't miss Saint-Creux-du-Bonheur, a comedy about a Montreal radio host trying to find a balance between his family and his work life. (Until August 19, 2023.)

Sherbus introduces a new route

This company. which offers guided bus tours of Sherbrooke, is now running "mini" trips – <u>Sherbus-micros</u>. Every Thursday evening, the bus stops at four local microbreweries during which participants learn about the history and heritage of the city.

Walking tours around every corner of Sherbrooke!

A group of 14 guides calling themselves the "Sherbrooke Greeters" escort tourists from all over the province, indeed from all over the world (England, Argentina, Belgium, the United States, France, India, Mexico, to name a few..), The Greeters lead them around Sherbrooke, introducing the visitors to the many facets of the city. (New this summer are walks through the boroughs of Brompton and Lennoxville.)

The oldest hydroelectric power station in Quebec

The <u>Centrale Frontenac</u> is open to the general public every Thursday to Sunday. It's the oldest hydroelectric power station in Quebec that is still in operation and an exhibition -La *ville électrique* – highlights its history. Visitors may be able to picnic on the terrace. (Until September 3.)

Balado Sherbrooke – a poetic soundscape

Two Sherbrooke artists, collectively known as <u>Productions Muses & Chimères</u>, have created a podcast narrated with their own words to describe places around Sherbrooke. An immersive experience, these eight soundscapes of poetry encourage the listener to truly listen, pause in their tracks, to stroll and to take time to let the mind roam free and emotions bubble to the surface – truly a different way to experience the city while walking around or in the comfort of your own home.
